## **WAWAK: Source for Sewing Notions**

Sources for sewing notions come and go but WAWAK in New York City has been around since 1907.

Since our local fabric stores are slowly disappearing, the source for sewing notions becomes a real challenge. I don't know about you, but I have found that the big box store seems to be reducing notion choices and sometimes the simplest most used items are not available. So, I did some searching online and found that WAWAK had just what I was looking for and whole lot more at very good prices.

And they actually send a real catalog if you request it. I placed an order and was pleasantly surprised at the prices, which were extremely reasonable. Was not sure about the Gutermann thread weight listed for regular garment sewing. This is the thread I use as my machine works best with it. I ordered what I thought was the right weight. My order came in 2 days (there is a fulfillment center in Nevada).

Did I say they have "excellent" customer service? Got my order, found the thread to be too thick, so gave them a call. I spoke with a real person who knew her products. We found the correct weight and it was shipped to me asap.

If you have questions about any sewing notion, they can guide you to the correct one for your application. They're knowledgeable, stock every notion available, excellent prices and fast service. Give them a try and I'm sure you will be a satisfied sewist.
